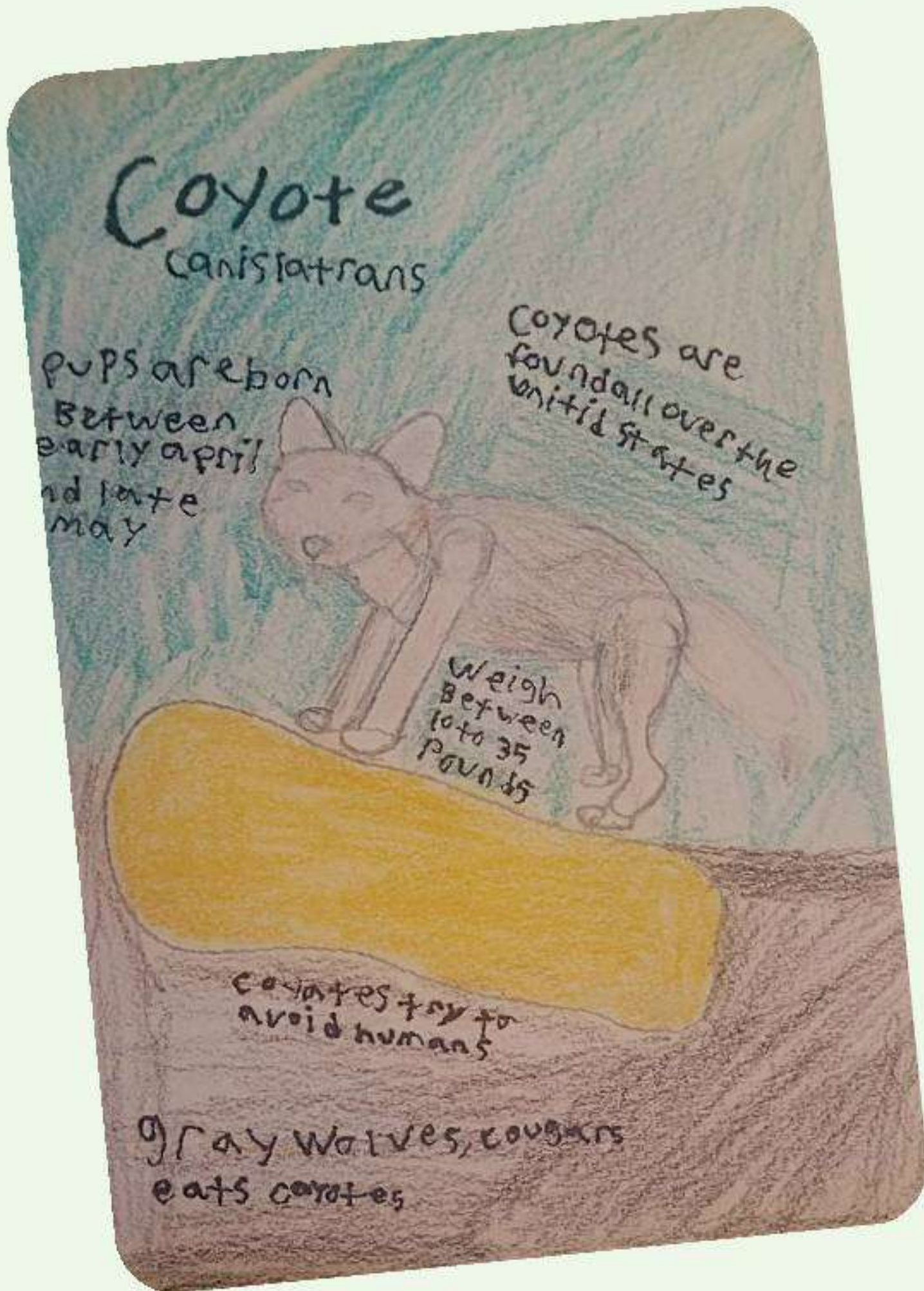

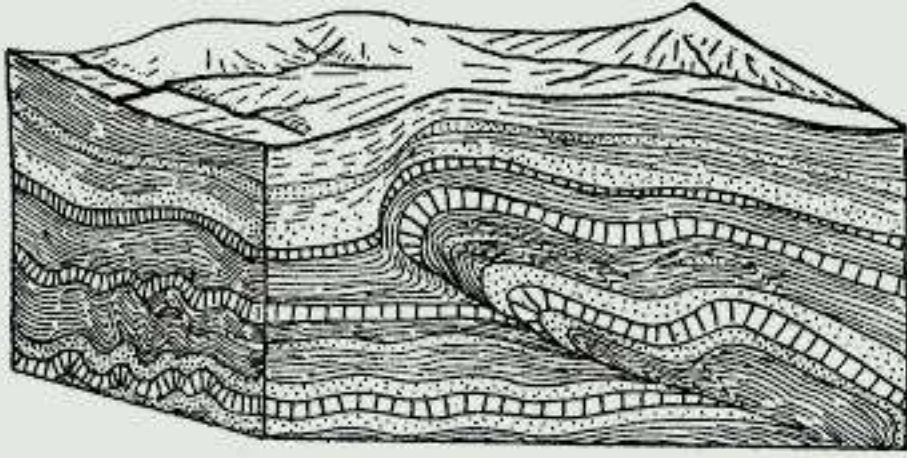

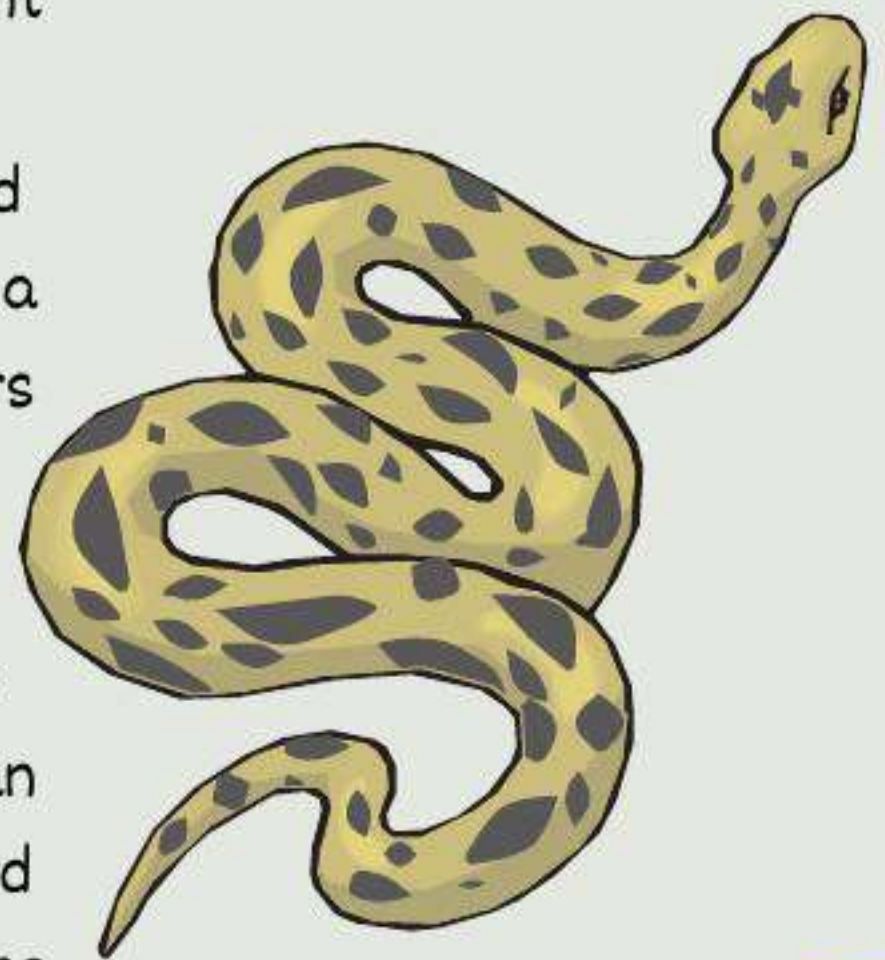

Pre-arrival:

I was close to the back, however I somehow managed to get a pickleball set. Afterward, we had a khutba by Omar, and a prayer led by Issa.

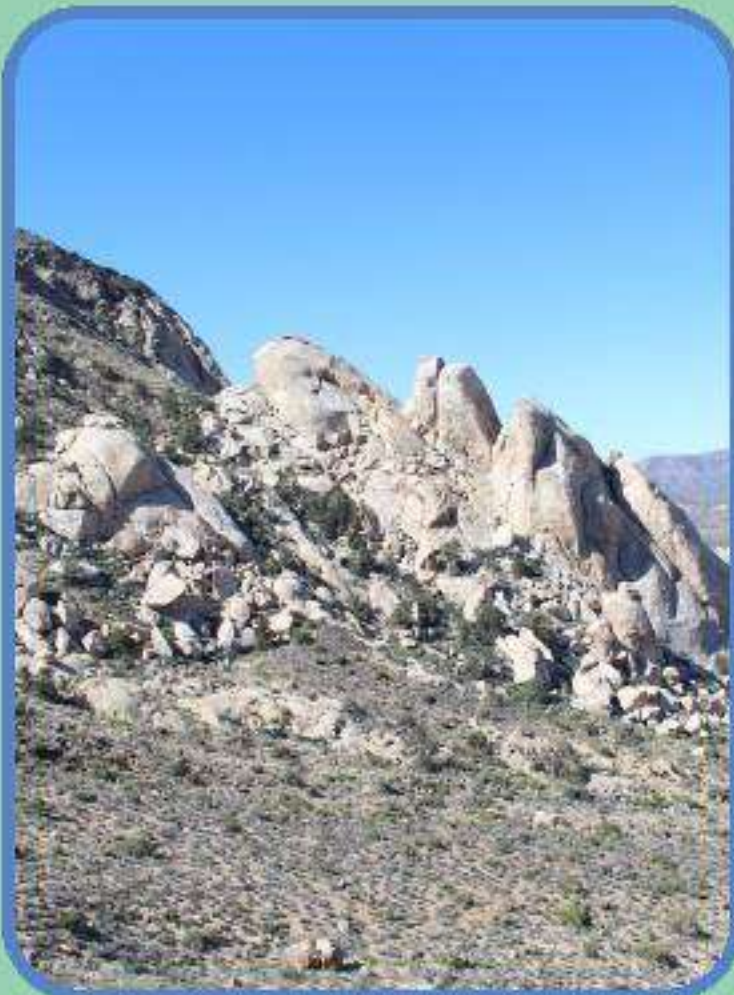


The First Hike:

He showed us how to build fires, the order of what to put in the fire first, and what type of wood was best for what cases.

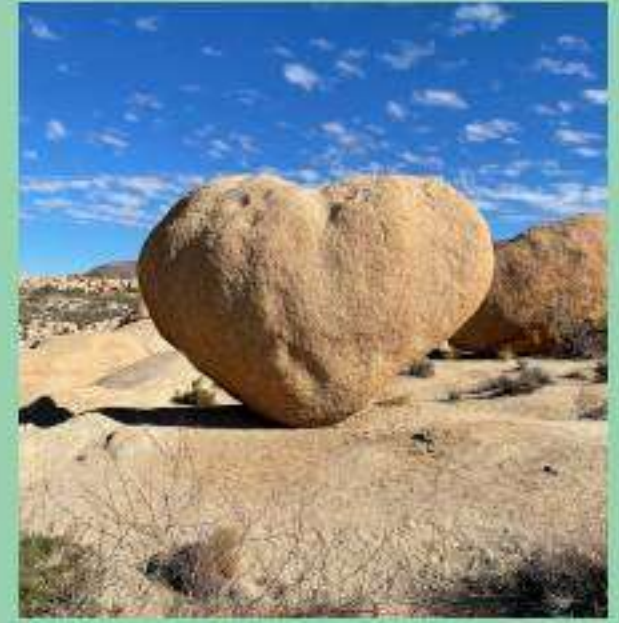

The Heart Rock:

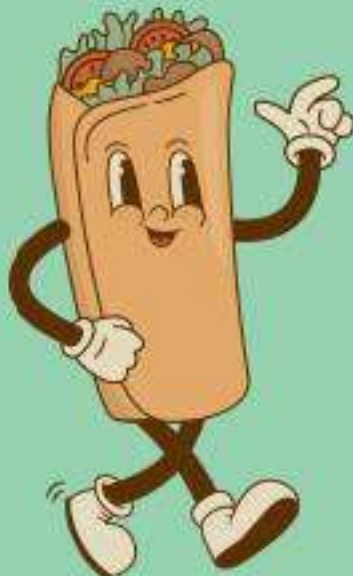

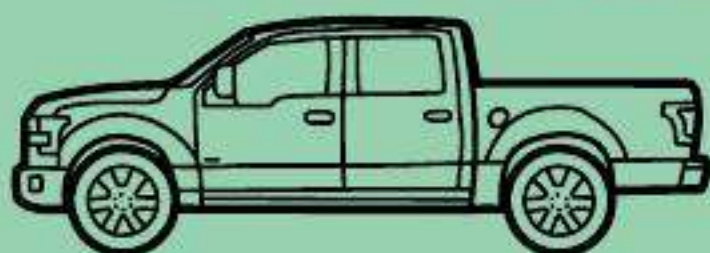

House Points



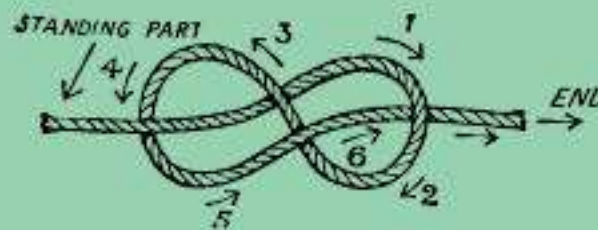
We then judged the photos taken by the other teams. It was close, but Sagebrush Stewards barely edged Fox Fangs out, winning a few extra points.

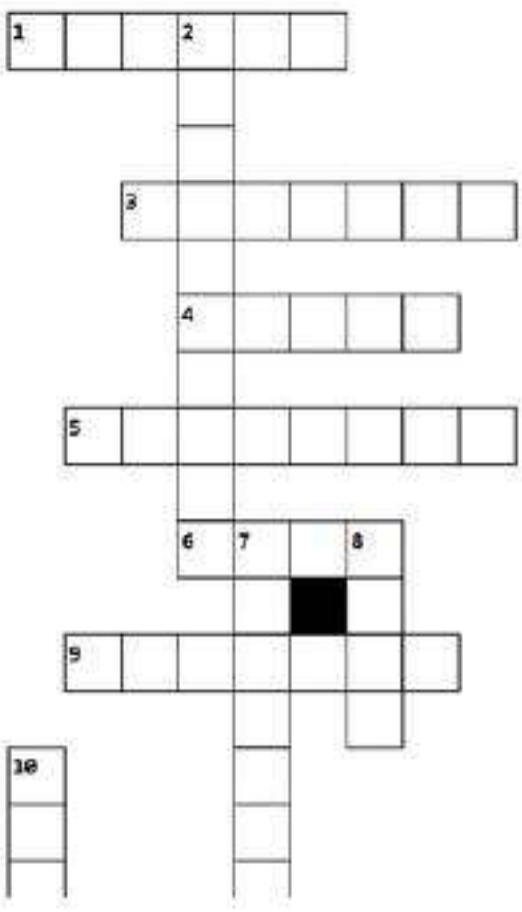

In a world where community and compassion can drive significant change, a group of dedicated students has come together to make a difference. Throughout the school year, these students have been earning points through various academic and extracurricular achievements. Instead of using these points for personal rewards, they decided to pool them together for a greater cause: building a water well in a village in Cambodia.



The Power of Collective Effort

The initiative began with a simple idea: to teach students the value of giving back to those in need. By converting their earned points into monetary contributions, the students were able to raise a substantial amount of money.

This collective effort not only fostered a sense of unity among the students but also highlighted the impact of working together towards a common goal.



Cambodia, a country known for its rich history and culture, faces significant challenges when it comes to access to clean water. Nearly 3.4 million people in Cambodia do not have basic access to safe drinking water¹. In rural areas, the situation is even more dire, with many communities relying on contaminated water sources. The lack of clean water leads to numerous health issues and hampers the overall development of these communities.



With the funds raised and with the help of their teacher, the students partnered with a local organization specializing in water projects. The organization helped identify a village in dire need of a clean water source. The construction of the water well began, bringing hope and excitement to the villagers. This well would provide safe drinking water, improve sanitation, and reduce the prevalence of waterborne diseases.

This project taught the students invaluable lessons about empathy, teamwork, and the importance of giving back. They learned that even small contributions, when combined, can lead to significant change. The experience also broadened their understanding of global issues and the importance of sustainable development.

The water well in Cambodia stands as a testament to what can be achieved when young minds come together for a noble cause. It not only provides a vital resource to the village but also serves as an inspiration for other communities to take similar initiatives. The students' efforts have shown that with determination and compassion, we can make the world a better place, one step at a time.

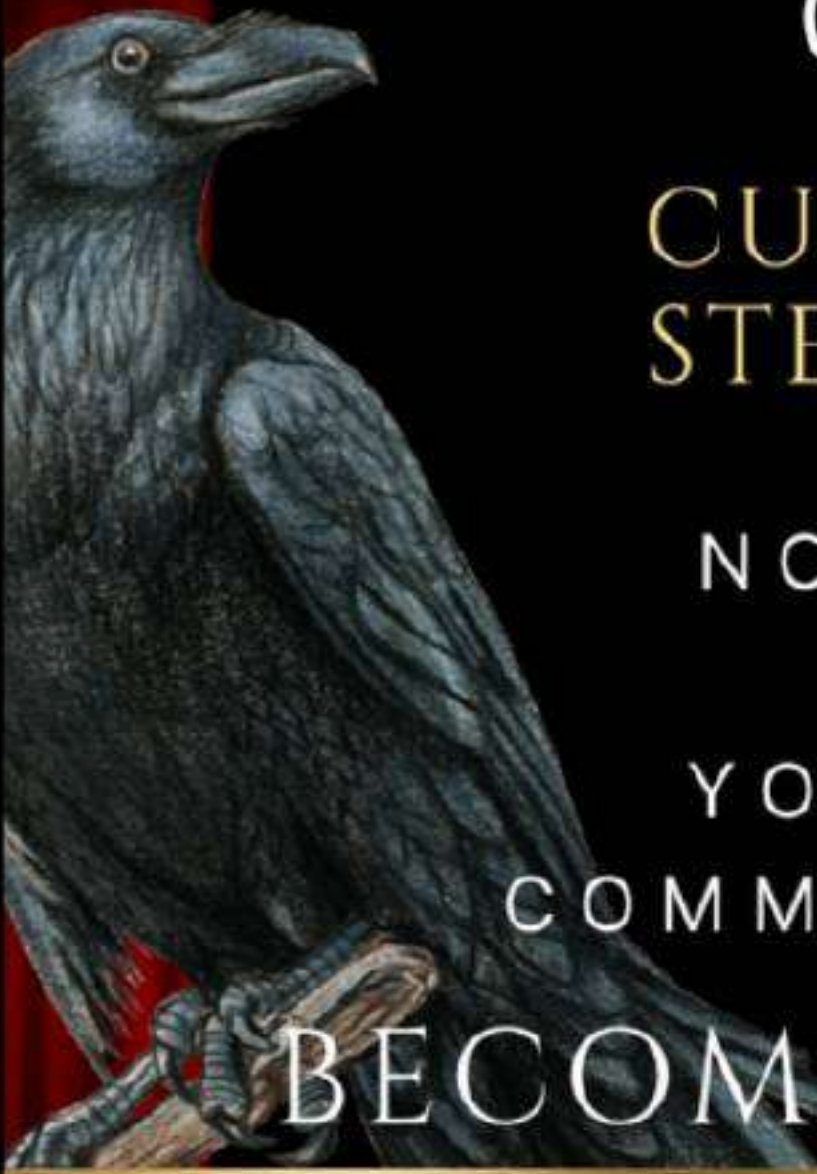
